On September 20, 2016, the court heard the case of first-year candidates Jason Lyu v. Duriba Khan.

Mr. Lyu alleged that Ms. Khan violated *Title 3 SEC. 4.17* of the Student Government Election Code by posting a campaign poster on a kiosk near the Student Activity Center (SAC).

SEC 4.17 reads as follows:

“All electioneering activities of a candidate and/or his/her respective campaign staff must adhere to the parameters set forth by this code, the Student Government Constitution, University policy, system rules, state and federal law, and any other established policy applicable to the actions in question.”

Posting flyers/posters at unsanctioned locations is a violation of University policy. Having said this, the poster in question was posted on a kiosk that was in fact a sanctioned posting location.

Being that the poster was posted in a sanctioned posting location, this Court rules that there was no violation of the rules of campaigning. Mr. Lyu's complaint is hereby dismissed.

It is so ordered.
